GREELEY PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY BOARD MEETING MINUTES – May 7, 2021

1. ROLL CALL

The Greeley Parks and Recreation Advisory Board met Friday, May 7, 2021 at 7:00am via virtual meeting. Board members joining were: Scott McPherson, Marshall Parks, Mikyla Silva, Louise Wilson, Philip Fulcher, Caitlin Alexander and Vincente Vega Ruiz. Staff joining were: Andy McRoberts (Director of Culture, Parks, and Recreation), Eric Bloomer (Parks Superintendent), Scott Schuttenberg (Recreation Superintendent), Justin Scharton (Natural Areas and Trails Superintendent) and Nancy Milton (Office Manager).

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA – Motion to accept by Marshall Parks, second by Louise Wilson.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – A motion was made by Marshall Parks to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. The motion was seconded by Vicente Vega Ruiz and passed 5-0.

4. PUBLIC INPUT

5. BOARD MEMBER COMMITTEE REPORTS – Art Commission: Six new designs were approved for utility cabinet wraps and locations are being determined for placement. Glenmere Park will be receiving two kinetic art sculptures that are being funded by a donation.

6. STAFF REPORTS

Andy McRoberts

- The Arbor Day celebration will take place at 9am today at the Meeker Home. There Cost Recovery Plan will be presented to City Council on May 11, but will not be adopted by resolution. It will instead be an administrative policy.

Justin Scharton

- Staff has received word from a landowner north of Signature Bluffs that they are willing to work with the City on certain lands. There is a possibility with GOCO about possibly being a significant partner in funding for the Shurview Project in this next year's cycle.

Eric Bloomer

- The Colorado Health Foundation has awarded funding for engagement and development in the Delta Park neighborhood of east Greeley. This will be a 30 month grant with the first year being mainly engagement followed by design and improvements. The Share the Shade event went extremely well and we are hoping to make this an annual event.

Scott Schuttenberg

- Plans are underway to open Centennial and Discovery Bay outdoor pools on May 29 at reduced capacity and using SignUp Genius to allow customers to make a reservation. Staff are in the process of hiring several positions which include two Recreation Coordinators for Youth Sports, a Fitness Coordinator and Administrative Specialist. The Recreation Sports Supervisor position and AIR Program Coordinator positions have been filled, as well as three positions at the Active Adult Center. The Rodarte Center is gearing up for the Summer Fun in the Sun Program which will operate at a capacity of 140. The program was originally capped at 75% of enrollment reserved for youth who qualify for free or reduced lunches through District, however we reached that cap and have since opened the remaining registrations to those applicants as well. Marshall Parks asked about donations and Scott replied that donations are welcome and accepted for the Youth Assistance Fund which is used by applicants for not only the FITS Program, but many of the programs offered through the Recreation Division. Staff are also working in collaboration with UNC for the Summer STEM Program that is funded by United Way. The Active Adult Center is scheduled to open on June 1.

7. OLD BUSINESS

- A. White-Plumb Farm: The process to divest this property has stopped at this time. CPRD will continue to maintain and preserve the property for the foreseeable future as a special use site and park.

8. NEW BUSINESS

- A. Consideration of a Memorial Bench Application – Hurley Family

Mrs. Charis Hurley has submitted an application for a new memorial bench to be installed in Twin Rivers Park near the flag poles in front of the Family FunPlex. Rick Reeser had submitted his vote to Scott McPherson prior to the meeting and was in favor of option 2. Following discussion of both locations, a motion was made by Marshall Parks to recommend approval of the Memorial Bench installation for the Hurley Family at Twin Rivers Park as presented by option 1. The motion was seconded by Mikyla Silva and passed 7-0.

PARKS & RECREATION ADVISORY BOARD

STAFF REPORTS – July 2, 2021

Andy McRoberts – Director of Culture, Parks, and Recreation

- Staff have submitted budget information for 2022 which includes a total of 28 budget increase requests in operations and master planning. The 28 individual requests total \$3.7 million offset by projected earned revenues of \$1 million – for a net request of \$2.7 million. In comparison, the CPRD expense budget was reduced by ~\$2.9 million from 2020 to 2021. Requests include bringing the vast majority of services back to pre-pandemic levels as well as growth in community needs and outdoor maintenance within Parks and Natural Areas & Trails. Staff are also requesting funding for a **Community Needs Assessment** and subsequent departmental **Strategic Plan** as well as funding for a “**Wetland Mitigation Bank Feasibility Study**”.
- Staff are also working on bringing certain service levels up yet this year including childcare at the FunPlex, increased fitness programs, youth and adult sports, and re-opening the climbing wall at the Recreation Center.
- We are actively working with Weld County Boys and Girls Clubs in regards to developing a stand alone “Teen Center”. We are proposing to provide land within Island Grove Regional Park and WCBGC will fund and operate the facility. Currently, WCBGC is hiring an architectural firm to develop a concept plan so that a rough design and proposed cost can be taken to the community to support fundraising efforts to construct the facility.
- As the City has a parkland dedication requirement for new developments, there is also an option to accept cash-in-lieu dependent upon park needs vs. availability of land. We recently conducted an updated Assessment of land values and will be modifying the cash-in-lieu value from \$35,000/acre to \$49,500/acre.
- Events – the Culture Division is hosting the outdoors Farmers Market (highly successful this year and has exceeded previous year’s sales) and staff is planning heavily for the Arts Picnic at Lincoln Park (July 24 & 25), and Neighborhood Nights (free movies in the parks). Movies scheduled are as follows:
 - July 30 - East Memorial Park – Rango
 - Aug. 6 - Sanborn Park - Labyrinth
 - Aug. 13 - Anna Gimmestad Park - Croods: A New Age
 - Aug. 20 – Farr Park - Sandlot
 - Aug. 27 – Sherwood Park - Shrek
- Staff is meeting with District 6 personnel to solidify an updated Joint Use Agreement of facilities.

Eric Bloomer – Parks Superintendent

Parks

- Due to unprecedented declines in seasonal job applicants, the Parks Division had to make the tough decision to suspend renting Park Shelters for the summer after June 3. We will honor all reservations booked up to that date no matter what day they rented up to the end of the season, we will just not be adding any new ones. There are simply not enough staff to have every facility prepped and ready for a paying customer so we felt it was the best customer service decision to not take paid rentals for the rest of the 2021 season.
- Demolition of the Broadview Park shelter was done on June 23. We are holding off on removal of the playground until we have an install date from the contractor.
- The first mowing of the season in the new native areas was completed at Bittersweet Park. Staff did a second mowing the week of June 21 to clean-up and prepare for broadleaf weed spraying which will take place the week of June 28.
- Twin Rivers Community Park will play host to the annual Sparkler Tournament the entire week of June 28. This large regional tournament utilizes facilities up and down the Front Range for girls’ softball of all ages.

Linn Grove Cemetery

- The annual Memorial Day event was a success and staff received a lot of positive feedback about the presentations and service overall.

- The new Columbarium has been ordered and staff will now begin to prep the area where this new unit will be placed. We anticipate having it ready for use by the end of the summer.

Scott Schuttenberg - Recreation Superintendent

Recreation

- The Recreation Center and Family FunPlex are both running at full capacity.
- Recreation has started hosting rentals groups including a Pfizer COVID Vaccine Clinic with Weld County and Steve Smiley UNC Basketball Camp.
- Family FunPlex is in the process of hiring a full-time Customer Service Representative.
- Sneeze guards have been removed from the guest service desks at all buildings with the exception of the Active Adult Center.
- Recreation is hoping to resume childcare at the FunPlex by the end of the summer or into early fall.

Active Adult Center

- The Active Adult Center is up and running with on average of nearly 75 seniors in each day for drop in activities.
- The Weld County Friendly Fork meals will resume on Monday, June 28. Meals will be served on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.
- Monthly newsletter production and distribution will resume in August and will feature registration-based programming and drop in activities.
- A new roof is currently being installed on the Active Adult Center and should be complete by early July.
- The parking lot construction is now complete and seniors are very happy with the new layout.

Aquatics

- Recreation has had to cancel open swim at Centennial Pool due to a current lifeguard shortage. Training courses were offered June 18-20 as well as June 25-27. Recreation is currently going through the hiring and onboarding process for several of these newly certified individuals.
- Swim lesson classes continue to fill up.
- Open swim at Discovery Bay and the Family FunPlex continue to be quite popular each day of the week.

Fitness

- We have increased capacities in classes slightly – from 12 to 15 at the FunPlex and from 10 to 12 at the Rec Center. Most classes are full or 75% filled each week.
- Recreation is currently conducting interviews for the Recreation Coordinator II – Fitness & Wellness position. We hope to hire in the position in the next few weeks.

Ice Haus

- Ice Haus will have its maintenance shutdown June 28-July 4. The protective rink netting is being replaced by Becker Arena Products and the rink staff will re-do the ice.
- All of the rink's user groups will be active for the 2021-2022 season as a result of the pandemic restrictions being lifted. This includes the return of UNC Hockey which did not have a team last year and the Greeley Growlers (women's hockey team), who cancelled the majority of their season. The other user groups include Greeley Youth Hockey Association, Northern Colorado Eagles, Mountain View Skating Club, UNC Figure Skating, and Greeley Freeze.
- Registrations for Learn-to-Skate, Learn-to-Play-Hockey, and Adult Leagues have been very strong through summer session 1 with historically high numbers of 396 registrations. Registration for session 2 should be decent as well, though expecting slightly lower numbers due to vacations. Staff are anticipating record numbers for registrations in the fall.

Sports

- Whitney Dyer has started as the Recreation Supervisor for Sports. She is in the process of hiring two coordinator positions that will work with her to offer programs for children and adults.
- Youth T-Ball is currently underway and staff are in the process of planning fall soccer and flag football.
- Recreation is partnering with Elite football to offer tackle football for Greeley Youth this fall.

- Adaptive and Inclusive programs also have a new staff member, Kassi Decruir. Kassi will be partnering with community organizations as well as staff from throughout the city to ensure people with disabilities are able to participate in programs and have proper resources.

Rodarte Community Center/Youth Enrichment

- The boxing program has returned to the Rodarte Community Center and currently there are 9 youth and 1 adult participating.
- The Fun in the Sun program was limited to 140 youth for the summer of 2021. The program started on May 24 and will conclude July 30.
- The STEM Summer Scholars program currently has 11 middle school students registered. Staff collaborate with the CSU Extension Office for coding, with programming assistance from a UNC professor and mathematics graduate student.
- Staff are working on a plans to reopen Anna Gimmestad location in August for after school programming.
- The Fishing Derby was held on June 5 from at Sanborn Park. Nearly 300 people attended. .
- World Refugee Day was held on June 20 at Delta Park. Recreation staff were there to support the event and provide mobile recreation activities with our “Play on the Way” program.
- An International Neighborhood Program will be every Saturday at Delta Park. Recreation staff will be providing activities alongside the High Plains Library District.
- Rodarte staff are passing out nutritious meals Mondays and Wednesdays all summer long from 3-5 pm at Delta Park.

- Island Grove PRT Trailhead** | Trailhead construction is largely completed, with punch list items remaining, along with the port-a-let structure, interpretive and wayfinding signage. The trailhead will remain closed during the Greeley Stampede.
- Poudre River Trail - Poudre Ponds** | The Poudre River trail section inside Poudre Ponds was opened on June 21, ahead of the summer bike to work day. The remainder of the site remains closed for the next few months due to the ongoing Water & Sewer project. An emergency repair was required along a section of this trail due to riverbank sloughing along the trail during runoff. Repairs that are more permanent will be required this fall/winter.
- Sheep Draw Trail 83rd Ave. Underpass Section** | An Award of Bid has been processed to complete this last large remaining section of the trail
- East Memorial NA** | Construction is underway, with earthmoving dominating the site at this stage.

Title:

Park Naming Process – new park within the Promontory subdivision

Summary:

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board is charged with recommending names for new parks and natural areas. Recently, developers within the Promontory subdivision started the platting process for additional development or residential and other properties. Attached is a site map of the proposed new park location.

The park itself is not slated for construction any time in the near future although there has been some discussion on development of the subdivision soon. The park construction will be coordinated with build-out of the new development and the collection of park development impact fees to pay for construction.

Naming of parks is identified in the Greeley Municipal Code, Chapter 2.29.060 (6) "To recommend to the City Council the name of new parks or renaming existing parks under the jurisdiction of the Department of Culture, Parks and Recreation", and is further outlined in the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board by-laws (also attached).

The purpose of this agenda item is to identify how the Board wants to proceed in regards to soliciting names from the public or to utilize any other methodology to finalize a recommendation to City Council.

The last attachment in the packet is a list of potential park names that were previously developed by the Board which may be used as a guide in the naming process. This list is not all inclusive and is not a requirement to utilize in the final naming process – it is simply a tool to be used as a reference.

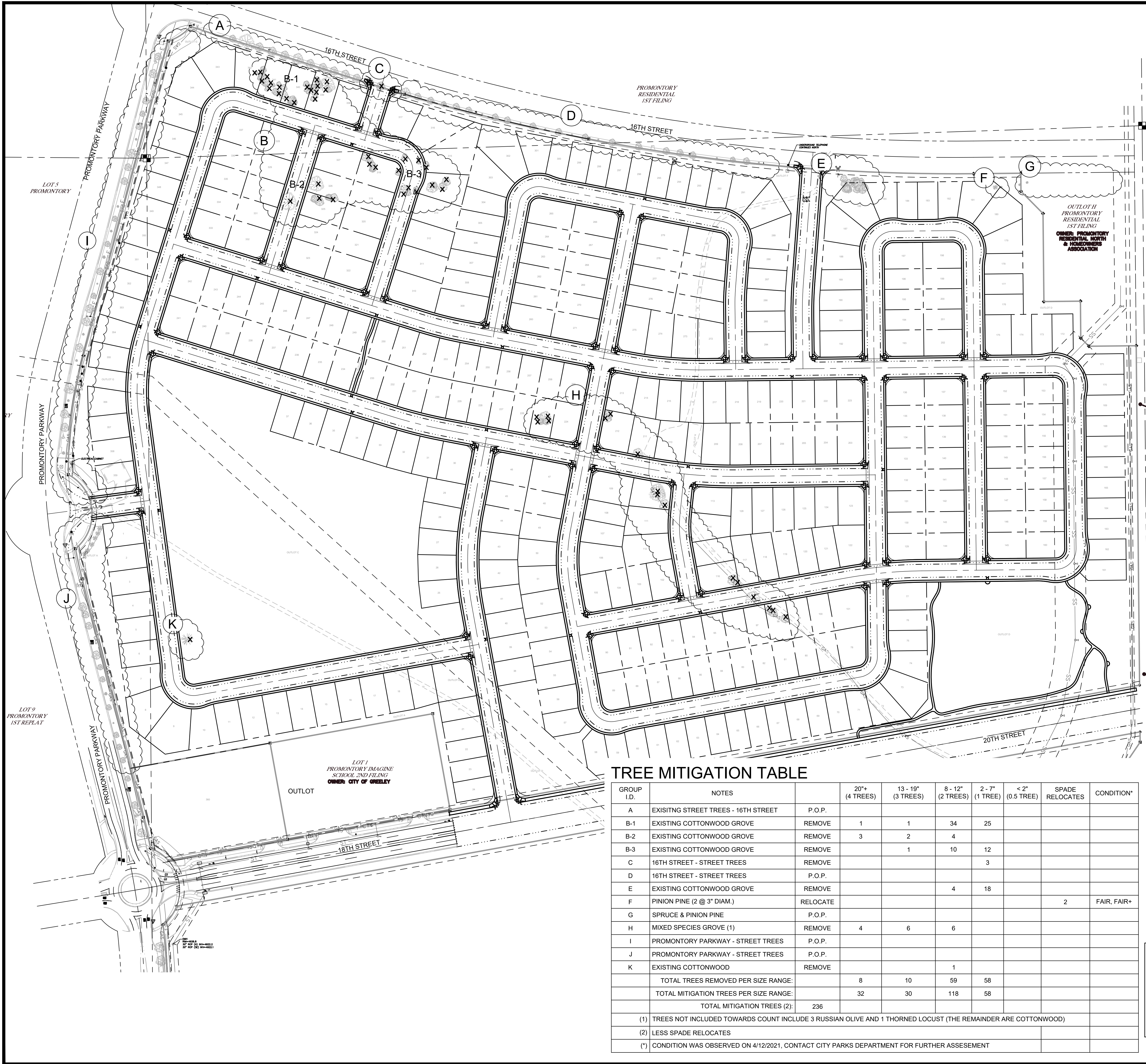

TREE PROTECTION NOTES

- ALL EXISTING TREES WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE DEVELOPMENT AND AND WITHIN RANGE OF CONSTRUCTION OPERATIONS SHALL REMAIN AND BE PROTECTED UNLESS NOTED ON THESE PLANS FOR REMOVAL.
- WITHIN THE DRIP LINE OF ANY PROTECTED EXISTING TREE, THERE SHALL BE NO CUT OR FILL OVER A FOUR-INCH DEPTH UNLESS A QUALIFIED ARBORIST OR FORESTER HAS EVALUATED AND APPROVED THE DISTURBANCE.
- ALL PROTECTED EXISTING TREES SHALL BE PRUNED TO THE CITY FORESTRY STANDARDS. TREE PRUNING AND REMOVAL SHALL BE PERFORMED BY A BUSINESS THAT HOLDS A CURRENT CITY OF GREELEY ARBORIST LICENSE WHERE REQUIRED BY CODE.
- PRIOR TO AND DURING CONSTRUCTION, BARRIERS SHALL BE ERECTED AROUND ALL PROTECTED EXISTING TREES WITH SUCH BARRIERS TO BE OF ORANGE FENCING A MINIMUM OF FOUR (4) FEET IN HEIGHT, SECURED WITH METAL T-POSTS, NO CLOSER THAN SIX (6) FEET FROM THE TRUNK OR ONE-HALF (½) OF THE DRIP LINE, WHICHEVER IS GREATER. THERE SHALL BE NO STORAGE OR MOVEMENT OF EQUIPMENT, MATERIAL, DEBRIS OR FILL WITHIN THE FENCED TREE PROTECTION ZONE.
- DURING THE CONSTRUCTION STAGE OF DEVELOPMENT, THE APPLICANT SHALL PREVENT THE CLEANING OF EQUIPMENT OR MATERIAL OR THE STORAGE AND DISPOSAL OF WASTE MATERIAL SUCH AS PAINTS, OILS, SOLVENTS, ASPHALT, CONCRETE, MOTOR OIL OR ANY OTHER MATERIAL HARMFUL TO THE LIFE OF A TREE WITHIN THE DRIP LINE OF ANY PROTECTED TREE OR GROUP OF TREES.
- NO DAMAGING ATTACHMENT, WIRES, SIGNS OR PERMITS MAY BE FASTENED TO ANY PROTECTED TREE.
- LARGE PROPERTY AREAS CONTAINING PROTECTED TREES AND SEPARATED FROM CONSTRUCTION OR LAND CLEARING AREAS, ROAD RIGHTS-OF-WAY AND UTILITY EASEMENTS MAY BE "RIBBONED OFF," RATHER THAN ERECTING PROTECTIVE FENCING AROUND EACH TREE AS REQUIRED IN SUBSECTION (G)(3) ABOVE. THIS MAY BE ACCOMPLISHED BY PLACING METAL T-POST STAKES A MAXIMUM OF FIFTY (50) FEET APART AND TYING RIBBON OR ROPE FROM STAKE-TO-STAKE ALONG THE OUTSIDE PERIMETERS OF SUCH AREAS BEING CLEARED.
- THE INSTALLATION OF UTILITIES, IRRIGATION LINES OR ANY UNDERGROUND FIXTURE REQUIRING EXCAVATION DEEPER THAN SIX (6) INCHES SHALL BE ACCOMPLISHED BY BORING UNDER THE ROOT SYSTEM OF PROTECTED EXISTING TREES AT A MINIMUM DEPTH OF TWENTY-FOUR (24) INCHES. THE AUGER DISTANCE IS ESTABLISHED FROM THE FACE OF THE TREE (OUTER BARK) AND IS SCALED FROM TREE DIAMETER AT BREAST HEIGHT AS DESCRIBED IN THE CHART BELOW:

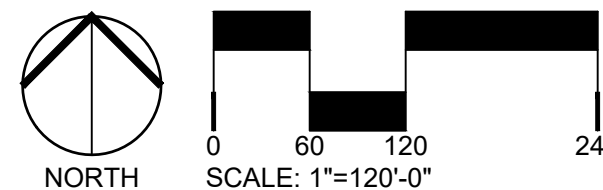

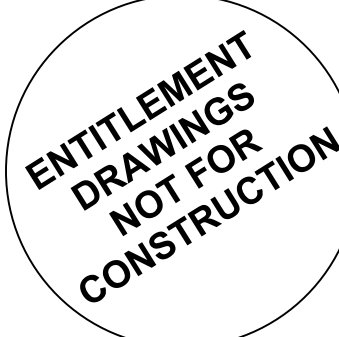

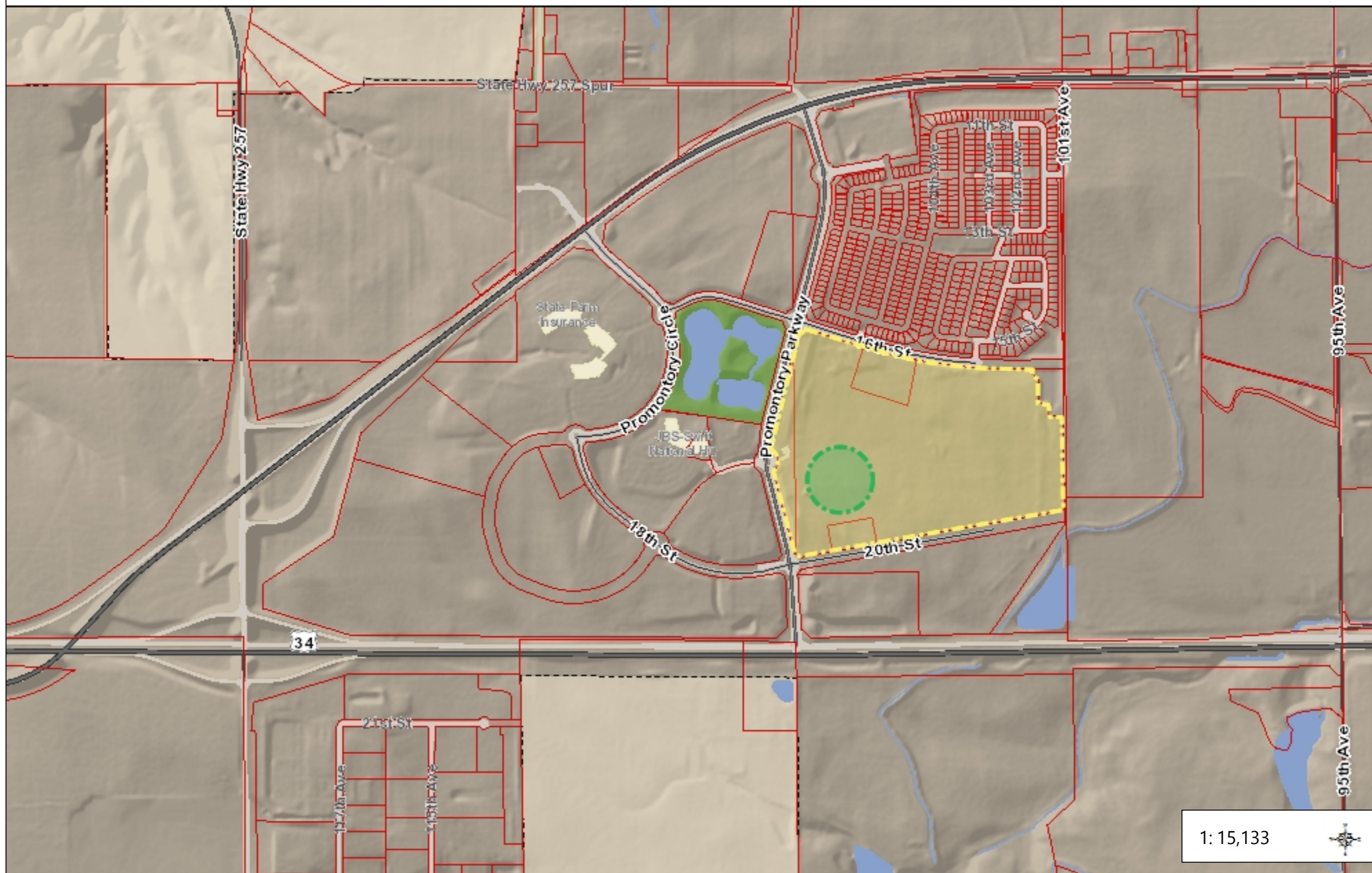
EXISTING TREE PLAN

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING SECTIONS 9.16.050 – 19.16.070 AND AMENDING PORTIONS OF CHAPTERS 13.41 AND 13.42 OF THE CITY OF GREELEY MUNICIPAL CODE, ALL REGARDING FORESTRY REQUIREMENTS IN THE CITY OF GREELEY

WHEREAS, the City of Greeley, Colorado, (the “City”), is a home rule municipality, organized and existing under Article XX, Section 6 of the Colorado Constitution; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article XX, Section 6 of the Colorado Constitution, the right to enact, administer and enforce ordinances relating to forestry is clearly within the constitutional grant to power to the City and is necessary to ensure the clear passage of vehicles through the right-of-way and otherwise mitigate dangerous or noxious conditions caused by trees or shrubbery; and

WHEREAS, it becomes necessary to update the Greeley Municipal Code (the “Code”) from time to time to reflect modern practices and eliminate language and references rendered redundant or obsolete by the passage of time; and

WHEREAS, more specifically, the updates contained herein will eliminate obsolete cross-references and unduly specific code provisions, increase the required height of tree limbs overhanging street level to accommodate newer-model maintenance vehicles, update the minimum distance trees should be planted in relation to sidewalks and street corners in response to common practices used developers in the City, and provide increased flexibility to City staff in its efforts to enforce the Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF GREELEY, COLORADO:

Section 1: That Sections 9.16.050, 9.16.060 and 9.16.70 of Chapter 9.16, Hazards to Health and Environment are hereby repealed.

Section 2: That Sections 13.41.010 and 13.41.030 of Chapter 13.41, Tree Trimmers, shall be amended as shown in Appendix A.

Section 3: That Sections 13.42.030, 13.42.040, 13.42.050, 13.42.060, 13.42.180, and 13.42.190 of Chapter 13.42, Trees and Vegetation, shall be amended as shown in Appendix A.

Section 4: This ordinance shall become effective on the fifth day following its final publication as provided by Section 3-16 of the Greeley City Charter.

APPENDIX A

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING SECTIONS 9.16.050 – 19.16.070 AND AMENDING PORTIONS OF CHAPTERS 13.41 AND 13.42 OF THE CITY OF GREELEY MUNICIPAL CODE, ALL REGARDING FORESTRY REQUIREMENTS IN THE CITY OF GREELEY GREELEY MUNICIPAL CODE

Section 1: That Sections 9.16.050, 9.16.060 and 9.16.70 of Chapter 9.16, Hazards to Health and Environment are hereby repealed.

~~9.16.050—Elm bark beetles; responsibility of owner.~~

~~The entire City shall be considered as the specific area or zone within which elms are to be protected. Trees, or parts thereof, of elm in a dead or dying condition that are or may serve as breeding places for the European elm bark beetle are a public nuisance and shall be removed and destroyed or buried by the owner of the tree or trees.~~

~~9.16.060—Elm bark beetles; tree inspection.~~

~~The administrative authority shall examine and inspect all trees within the City on both public and private property for signs of breeding of elm bark beetles.~~

~~9.16.070—Elm bark beetles; breeding places unlawful.~~

~~It is unlawful for any owner or occupant of any premises within his or her control to maintain trees or store wood furnishing breeding places for the elm bark beetles. Such trees or wood shall include the following:~~

- ~~(1) Dead or dying or obviously weakened elm trees, regardless of species or variety;~~
- ~~(2) Dead or dying or obviously weakened branches in otherwise healthy elms;~~
- ~~(3) Stumps of cut trees on which the bark remains; and~~
- ~~(4) Elm wood cut from trees, whether or not they were diseased, that is cut and piled for fireplace wood, whether stored indoors or out.~~

Section 2: That Sections 13.41.010 and 13.41.030 of Chapter 13.41, Tree Trimmers, shall be amended as shown in Appendix A.

13.41.010 - Trimming or felling trees; license required.

No person or firm shall engage in the business of trimming or removing trees in the City without first obtaining a license to conduct such business pursuant to Section ~~6.04.540~~ 6.07.010 of this Code. The business described in this Chapter shall be referred to as tree trimming and all persons and firms engaging in that business shall be known as tree trimmers.

...

13.41.030 - Permit required for trimming or removal in parkway or public right-of-way.

No tree trimmer shall remove or trim any tree in a parkway ~~as defined in Section 18.42.030~~ or in a public right-of-way without first obtaining a permit from the City Manager or his or her designee, and paying the fees required.

(1) The City Manager or his or her designee shall not issue a permit unless the tree to be removed or trimmed is dead or interferes with the proper use of parkways for sidewalk purposes or creates traffic hazards.

(2) No tree shall be removed until the tree has been posted for at least seven (7) days with a sign notifying the public of the contemplated removal unless otherwise deemed an emergency by the City Manager or his or her designee.

(3) All tree stumps shall be properly removed or ground to a minimum of six (6) inches below normal ground level. Any remaining cavity resulting from such excavation shall be properly filled and compacted with quality soil to normal ground level.

Section 3: That Sections 13.42.030, 13.42.040, 13.42.050, 13.42.060, 13.42.180, and 13.42.190 of Chapter 13.42, Trees and Vegetation, shall be amended as shown in Appendix A.

13.42.030 - Diseased and dangerous tree, shrub and plant inspection.

~~It shall be the duty of the City Manager or his or her designee to~~ The City Manager or his or her designee may inspect all trees, shrubs, stumps, cut wood (firewood) and plants within the City to determine whether they are afflicted with insect pests, fungus or other disease detrimental to the growth, life and health of such trees, shrubs, stumps, cut wood (firewood) and plants; and to make such inspections for the additional purpose of discovering any trees, boughs or vegetation that may be dangerous to persons or property.” It shall be the duty of all owners or persons in possession of property within the City to eradicate, remove, destroy or otherwise correct the condition found in such inspection.

13.42.040 - Notice and correction

~~It shall be the duty of the City Manager or his or her designee to~~ The City Manager or his or her designee may notify the owner or other persons in possession of the premises where such conditions exist as are described in this Chapter, and to direct the owner or other person in possession to eradicate, remove, destroy and otherwise correct the condition described in the notice, within the time set forth in the notice.

13.42.050 - Correction of dangerous or diseased condition.

~~It shall be the duty of the City Manager or his or her designee to~~ The City Manager or his or her designee may perform or cause to be performed any spraying, removal or other work as is necessary to correct any condition described at Section 13.42.030 above if the owner or other person in possession fails to do so within the time set forth in the notice.

13.42.060 - Traffic hazard or sidewalk-interfering vegetation; removal.

It shall be the duty of all owners or persons in possession of property within the City to remove from the parkways, or cause to be removed from parkways, any and all trees, boughs and vegetation which, in the opinion of the City Manager or his or her designee, interfere with the proper use of the parkways, overhang any sidewalks lower than eight (8) feet or overhang any streets lower than ~~thirteen (13)~~ fourteen (14) feet from the surfaces thereof, or create a traffic hazard.

~~13.42.180 – Trees planted near intersections:~~

~~It shall be the duty of all owners or persons in possession of property within the City to refrain from planting trees within twenty five (25) feet of the corner of any street intersection as defined in the description of clear vision zone of a corner lot in Section 18.26.030 of this Code.~~

13.42.190 - Clearance from curb or right-of-way of trees or woody plants.

It shall be the duty of all owners or persons in possession of property within the City to refrain from planting trees or woody plants ~~within five (5) feet of the back of the curb or, in the absence of a curb,~~ to refrain from planting on any portion of the right of way, until such time as curbing is installed near public sidewalks or curbing in such a manner as to cause physical damage to sidewalks, curbs, gutters, pedestrian ways, bike paths and other public improvements.
